

# Romano-British

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1<sup>st</sup> century BC – 1<sup>st</sup> Century AD

A transitional period when 'Belgic' related grog-tempered, wheel-made pottery existed alongside Late Iron Age shellywares and, at the latter end of the timespan, incoming Roman forms. Hard-fired sandy fabrics – some sparkle. Also, grog-tempered (can be grey, buff or brown). Often decorated with grooved horizontal lines or combing. Vessels often with a corrugated effect above the shoulder. 'Belgic' wares wheel-made, burnished – jars, bowls, cups and platters. Girth beakers were mid 1<sup>st</sup> century beakers with horizontal bands of corrugations (cordons).
